The training will also support pediatric care team members with skills to handle their own emotional fatigue and to strengthen their Relational Resilience.

Learning objectives:

- Describe how the We Are Resilient[™] approach is trauma-informed and supports providers, patients, and families in resilience skills and practices.
- Explain the importance of personal practice as a prerequisite to the Practice—Model—Coach method for teaching We Are Resilient™ to others.
- Identify when Protective Patterns arise and assess whether Protective Patterns are helping or hurting in each situation.
- Choose 1-2 Centering Skills to practice for challenging situations.
- Identify how focusing on resilience can improve ACE screening, both in creating conditions
 for more thorough responses and for helping healthcare providers become more effective
 companions on the healing journey with patients and families.
